### Group Study Questions

#### Opening Question:

#### General Observation:

5. The sermon stated that "the gospel is and will always be the hope of the world." How was this point developed and supported?

#### Personal Application:

6. How do you typically respond to political outcomes you disagree with? In light of this sermon, how might you adjust your response?

7. The pastor said, "Maybe it's time that the people of God, we start having God's dream for our life instead of the American dream for our life." What do you think he meant by this? How might this apply to your life?

8. How does the assurance that "evil will be defeated" impact your perspective on current events and the future?

9. In what areas of your life do you struggle to trust that "God is in control"? How can this sermon's message help you in those areas?

#### Action Steps:

10. What is one concrete way you can demonstrate trust in God's control this week, regardless of the election outcome?

11. How can you be a source of hope to others in your community, especially those who may be anxious about political outcomes?
